


CA Update



Start of Academic year 2016 – 2017



Arrangements for the start of term are as follows:

- **Monday 5th September** -The Academy is closed to all students for staff

Science Research Open Day at Royal Brompton Hospital



Year 10 and 12 students took part in a Science Research Open Day at the Royal Brompton Hospital where they demonstrated to the public what they had learnt about cellular organisation within the heart. There was also time for students to speak to researchers working on a wide range of medical technologies, including artificial hearts and medical imaging.

Maths & Physics Trip to Belgrade



This July, two Y10s, three Y11s and three Y13s headed to Belgrade in Serbia to take part in the fourth Mathematical Grammar School Maths Cup. They were competing with teams from all around Europe in papers on Maths, Physics and Computing. The papers were really challenging – when practicing the maths there were questions that Ms Michaelides and Mr Gilchrist struggled with and needed Daniel Fisaha in Y11 to show them how to do!

Everyone did really well in Maths and Physics with Atanasije winning a Bronze medal in Physics. When the team were not competing in the cup we visited beautiful Belgrade, going to the Tesla Museum, the local lake and eating amazing Serbian BBQ. We also got to meet and make new friends from all around Europe. Having had the experience, the Y10s Maria and Isabel, are already planning what we need to do to prepare for next year and come back with more medals!

Electric Racing Car wins first Award!



The Chelsea Academy Race Team (CART), Xavier (Y10), Skye, Momina and Zios (Y9), competed in the Greenpower race at Goodwood for the third year running. The Angry Gecko Mk2 had been carefully set up with new wheel covers, bodywork and different engine sprockets. As a result, the team managed 3 best ever result.

During the break between races we changed the bodywork on the bottom of the car and in the second heat we were even faster. Unfortunately the chain came off during a pit stop resulting in a ten minute delay for repairs pushing us back down the grid! We are now waiting to find out if our performance was good enough to get us into the national final in October.

They visited the new interactive gallery on "Who am I?" where they learned various aspects of human genetics, the ways that scientists study the brain, theories of intelligence. they had fun remodeling their faces as a teenager and as an old person!

In the new "Atmosphere gallery" they played various interactive games on how to run a whole city on a limited supply of electricity, found out about the importance of the Carbon cycle in nature and saw a hydrogen fueled car of the future. In the revamped "Materials gallery" they walked across a specially engineered glass bridge and saw clothing made from recycled materials. We ended the day with cookies and icecream. 
The KS3 Science Fair Final took place on Thursday 14th July and it was a wonderful showcase of our students' enthusiasm and creativity in science. Twenty projects were on display and the students presented them brilliantly. The event was attended by parents, teachers, and other members of our Academy community. This year there was even a judging panel of six professional scientists and STEM Ambassadors, who agreed on the best projects in Year 7 and Year 8. In Year 7 this was Karim Elkhatib, who designed a circuit with a pressure switch to help prevent accidents in the home, and in Year 8 Martin Vukovic won with his bicycle-powered phone charger! Zoi Kampe also won the 'most popular project' award with her beetroot investigation. Well done to all of the finalists! all of them have won Vivos, points for their house and a rewards trip.

KS5 Summer Science Exhibition



On the evening of 12th July, we hosted our annual Summer Science Exhibition. The evening showcases project work completed by our Year 12 Sciences students during the summer term. Each student chooses the title for their project and then has time in and out of lessons to carry out a literature review and discuss their own ideas. For students studying practical sciences, this project will enable them to achieve some of the criteria for the Practical Endorsement element of their A level courses. Visiting judges and governors were impressed by the quality of posters the students made, and the passion and insight with which students were able to discuss their work. 6th former wins Nuffield Bursary



Congratulations to one of our year 12 students, Hassan Abdulrahim, for successfully gaining a place on the Nuffield Research Placement. This scheme offers the opportunity to work alongside professional scientists and contribute to their research. Hassan is working with Imperial College London at Hammersmith Hospital on how the drug Metformin, used to treat diabetes mellitus, has shown positive effects at reducing cancer growth in breast cells. Hassan studies Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Psychology at Chelsea Academy Sixth Form and is hoping to study medicine in the future. He will gain many skills on this placement that will assist in his application to university.
