We have over 60 local organisations across Westminster, Kensington and Chelsea offering free activities and free, healthy meals across the school holiday period.

Activities are available for a minimum of 4 hours per day and include sports camps (football, basketball, boxing), arts & crafts, dance, sewing, adventure play, gardening, cooking, nature skills, and offsite trips. There will also be activities for those with special educational needs and disabilities - so there is something for everyone.

The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme guarantees a free place and a free meal to all children and young people eligible for means-tested Free School Meals who are aged 4 - 16. Visit the HAF website <u>here</u> to register

#### Keeping Your Child Safe

#### Safeguarding advice for parents: Nitrous Oxide

You may have read in the national press recently that one key safeguarding issue currently facing parents is the use of nitrous oxide by teenagers. Nitrous oxide (sometimes referred to as 'laughing gas' or 'nos') is a colourless gas sold in metal canisters and typically inhaled through a balloon for

'recreational' purposes.

Although the supply of nitrous oxide for its psychoactive effects is illegal, it is not currently a crime to possess the gas, which is now the second most commonly used drug by 16 - 24 year olds in the UK. As we went to press the government has announced plans to ban this drug. Further information about the risks associated with nitrous oxide can be found in the two articles linked below. 



Arkwright Engineering Scholarship-Year 11




This is our second cohort of students interested in taking part in the Arkwright Engineering

In February, our Year 8 students took part in the National Faraday Challenge which challenges some of our most talented students to think and work as engineers.


The competition is a STEM activity day run by the **Institute of Engineering and Technology** where students were set real-world challenges and put into teams to manage, plan and find a creative solution to a problem. Students are introduced to the challenge, have a mini-apprenticeship session to learn key skills and are then given a budget to purchase material to design and make their solution.

The Year 8s found the process challenging but rewarding at the same time. With this in mind, they were able to experience how engineers and project managers work under time restrictions and tight budgets.

The students who took part graduated as Industrial Cadets at Challenger level recognising the work they did on the day. Well Done Year 8!

#### Wren300- Engineering project- 'Build a Dome in a Day'


As part of the year-long Wren 300 celebrations, 80 Year 12 students aged 16-17 selected by the London Diocesan Board for Schools took part in a unique 'Build a Dome in a Day' engineering workshop in the nave at Holy Sepulchre, Holborn Viaduct – the second largest Wren City church and inner London's largest parish church. The workshop was funded by the **Royal Academy of Engineering's Ingenious Programme**.

Our Year 12 students proudly took part in the project and their responsibility was focusing on the aesthetics of the build. They worked alongside engineers to build the St Paul's Cathedral Dome replica.

The students came back to school the next day buzzing with excitement due to the experience.

Our Year 7s have been religiously attending Innovation club and our numbers are increasing! Students have experimented with different things in Technology including building structures using 3D pens and now we have a growing number of students eager to learn and engage with robotics.

After the Easter break we will be taking on the **Lego First League Competition**. We are looking for students in KS3 who want to take part in the competition. #### National Careers Week- Architecture Challenge

Year 10 students are busy revising for their RE GCSE exams which will be taking place in May, after completing another set of mocks to help them prepare.


#### **Science Department Update**

#### Science Week -



Some excited Year 8 students visited Juniper Hall Field Studies Centre in Dorking, Surrey. They were greeted by bright sunshine, blue skies and enthusiastic trainee teachers from King's College, London. After fun ice-breaker games, they carried out some field work like true biologists! One session was to carry out an investigation into the effect of pollution in two different ponds, by collecting and identifying tiny invertebrates, some of which are considered pollution indicators. They were delighted to find hundreds of the tiniest of creatures living in murky waters! This was followed by a discussion of the effect of human activity and pollution on the range of biodiversity of species and their abundance. The next session was to develop their team work, map reading and orienteering skills to navigate their way through different areas of Juniper Hall fields. This unit of work has focused on building students' resilience to radicalisation by promoting fundamental British values and developing their skills to challenge extremist views. After half term we are moving onto our statutory unit on Relationships and Sex Education, where we will be exploring the importance of making healthy choices.

Year 10 have now completed half of the GCSE course. This half term they have begun working on being an active citizens, where they will be developing a range of citizenship skills including: research and enquiry, interpretation of evidence, planning, collaboration, problem solving, advocacy, campaigning and evaluation. This unit of work will be worth 15% of their total GCSE grade.

Year 11 students are now busy revising for their Citizenship GCSE exams which will be taking place in May. We wish them all the best!
