

Academic Update

And just like that.... A new academic year is well underway. We have had a strong start to 2023/24 and the whole community has embraced our mission: Work Hard, Be Kind, No excuses.

There is no better time than a new academic year to practise good learning habits through Independent Learning (IL)

At home you can help through your involvement in your child's commitment and dedication to IL

The Education Endowment Foundation has conducted a substantive amount of research into the value of IL (or homework) for secondary school students:

1. Homework has a positive impact on average (+ 5 months), particularly with students in secondary schools.

- At the Academy we set student IL (homework) via google classroom and have invested in a wide range of digital platforms to support your child's learning, revision and reading at home.
- You can easily access logins to the digital platforms <u>here</u>
- Mr Rowe has also created a guide to our digital platforms: Digital Learning
- Ms Rickford our AP for Teaching & Learning has created a walk through video guide to support parents/carers with learning at home. You can access it here: <u>Study Support at Home</u>

2. Some students may not have a quiet space for home learning – it is important for schools to consider how home learning can be supported (e.g. through providing homework clubs for pupils).

- Our library is open Mon/Tues/Thurs/Friday from 8am and until 4.45pm. Students are welcome to use the library, which is supervised by <u>Miss Kempley</u>, to do their IL before/after school in a productive environment.
- The SEN Team also run IL Club for students by invitation.

Head of Year Update - Year 7


